The May 12, 2012 Meeting Agenda

The Central Group will present the program for this meeting.

Howard Renner will present a demonstration on the construction and the various styles of Cabriole Legs. A Cabriole leg is a generic form of a curved shapely leg as used in several styles of period furniture. They are typically found on Queen Anne an Chippendale style furniture. Queen Anne is typical a more plain or simple style while Chippendale is a more ornate style Howard will give several examples of Cabriole Leg styles and show several variations to the styles of the top portion of the legs and the style of the feet used for these legs. The presentation will use video that was filmed in Howards shop to show the actual steps in layout, the cutting and the steps in shaping the legs. The video should add a new dimension in education and skill building.

Logistics for the May Meeting

If you are bringing an entry to the contest, be sure to register with **Gary Claytor** and **Larry Lockwood** to get instructions and to ensure your entry is placed in the proper category. Best wishes to all of the contestants.

Contest Entry Information

Build anything that is primarily made of wood and completed between September 2011 and May 2012. It will be judged by the same criteria used in our past contests. Originality of design (how unique is it?), Functionality of design (how well does it work?), Artistic design (is it attractive?), Finish (sanding, stain, top coat) and Expertise required to complete (complex angles, joinery, inlay etc.).

Photos may be used to enter projects in cases where it is not practical to transport and display. A PowerPoint presentation will be used to display digital entry photos again this year when the contest is judged at the May 2012 meeting.

If wish to have your digital photos included in the presentation, please send them to Darrell at dmcanulty@cincinnatiwoodworkingclub.org, no later than May 8th. And limit your photos to 4 per entry.

As part of the Woodworking Contest, we will present our **3rd annual Fred Weissborn Memorial Quality Award**. It will go to the woodworker whose Contest entry is voted by members to best reflect the craftsmanship demonstrated by Fred during his long tenure as a member. The selection criteria will follow the principle that "craftsmanship" is in the eye of the beholder. Each voting member will determine the superior craftsmanship as he or she sees it and vote for the best entry. This award is a traveling trophy with the winner's name and project inscribed on it.

We congratulate **John Leonardi** as last year's winner of this prestigious award in May 2011. As a reminder, a member may only win this award one time. A winner is ineligible to compete for this award in a future contest. However, a winner remains eligible to compete for any other contest awards.



Reflections from the Prez ...

The May 2012 meeting is my last meeting as president. I want thank all my fellow volunteers for helping me make the club an organization that routinely attracts new members and keeps the rest of us coming back to have fun and learn more about woodworking.

It's hard to believe it's been 10 years since I raised my hand and volunteered to help the new club president. It was only my second club meeting after being freshly retired and looking to expand my hobbies. It was also the first time the club had met at the Northminster Presbyterian church. When I walked into the meeting, the election for the new president was apparently over. I heard Keith Mealy say something about the VP slot would remain open since no one wanted to do it. Then I heard him ask if anyone would like to volunteer to help out. I didn't truly realize I'd volunteered to be the vice president until Guy Miller called me a few days later to talk with me about my new role. As the saying goes, the rest is history.

Now, after four years as VP and six as president, it's time for me to move aside for new ideas and leadership. As I reflect back on changes over the last 10 years, the club has several milestones to celebrate.

- The club website was brought online in April 2004.
- More than 90% of our members get the Newsletter electronically.
- Electronic photo albums share our members' creations with the world.
- Our meetings and educational presentations are much more effective through the use of a first class audio visual setup.
- Our regular meeting attendance has increased significantly.
- In 2007, the club celebrated its 25 year anniversary.
- Our community service projects have expanded from the Christian Appalachian Project to include Cincinnati Children's Hospital, Jackson Area Ministries and Fernside.
- We have an expanded club Video & Book Library.
- An annual woodworking contest allows members to display their projects for tangible recognition.
- Continuation of an annual seminar program conducted by professional woodworkers from around the country (Glen D. Huey presented the most recent one this past Saturday; ironically Glen did his first seminar ever and my first at coordinating for the club, in 2003).

This list invokes some pleasant memories for me. As you read these reflections, you will probably have your own milestones and think of some I missed.

Thank you for your support and assistance. It helped make this role easier. I would be remiss if I didn't encourage you to volunteer to help my successors. The old adage of "the more you put in the more you get out" holds true.
