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Reminder: CWC 2008-2009 Woodworking Contest

The Challenge: Make a Toy or Build a Trebuchet

The purpose of the Contest Program is to encourage and invite participation in a woodworking project, to share ideas and expertise and to compete against your peers. The contest will be held at the last meeting of the year. Members will have the entire year to work on their contest entry, but the entry does not need to be made during the year. It could be something you made a long time ago that you are really proud of.

This year's contest gives members the opportunity to enter in two categories. The first category is to build a toy. It can be any kind of toy as long as it is made of wood. This could be a prototype for the toy program or a toy you've previously made and now you can make with hard woods or exotic wood. It could be a toy you would like to make as an heirloom for a child or grandchild. There are no rules or limitations as to size or type of toy you build. The only limitation is your own imagination.

Again, there will be two groups of contestants in the toy portion of the contest: the Previous Winner's group (those who have won first, second or third in the previous contests) and the General Population group (everybody else).

<u>This year there will be an additional category.</u> This category will be to build a miniature trebuchet to throw a tennis ball. For those of you who do not know what a trebuchet is (some of us did not). It is a catapult operated by gravity. A box of rocks is at one end of the fulcrum and a projectile is in a sling at the other. When a pin is pulled from under the box of rocks, it falls flinging the projectile through the air. This is an over simplification of the process as the length of the fulcrum is probably critical to make sure that the projectile does not go straight up into the air and come down on your head. The trebuchets will be tested prior to the May meeting. Andy Strain will coordinate the testing and certify the results of the tests (length of the throw) which will be considered in the contest judging.

The purpose of this category is an attempt to increase the number of participants and to give more members an opportunity to win. It offers a challenge to build a more complicated wooden project with moving parts. Members are invited to enter the toy contest, the trebuchet contest or both. Double your chances to win, double your fun.

Every member will be given a ballot at the May meeting. The General Population group will be designated as 101-199, the Previous Winner's group will be designated as 201-215 and the Trebuchet category will be designated as 301-315.

The members will vote for first, second and third in the General Population group, in the Previous Winner's group and in the Trebuchet group. You can only vote for an entry once and you cannot vote for your own project. A first place vote counts three points, a second place vote counts two points and a third place vote counts one point. The votes will be to-taled and the most points will be awarded first place, second most points second place and so on.

The entries will be judged using five criteria:

ORIGINALITY OF DESIGN (How unique is it?) FUNCTIONALITY OF DESIGN (How well does it work?) ARTISTIC DESIGN (Is it pretty?) FINISH (sanding, stain, top coat) TECHNICAL EXPERTISE (complex angles, joinery, inlay etc.)

Winners will be announced at the May meeting. 1st, 2nd, 3rd place and Honorable Mention winners will receive ribbons. And their projects will be featured in the newsletter and posted on our web site. All first, second and third place winners will be in the previous winners category for the next year's contest.

Dr. Keith Neer's Biography:



Dr. Keith Neer, after completing his PhD at the University of Nebraska, took a position with Virginia Polytechnic Institute (VPI) as an Assistant Professor. He later joined the Kroger Company in Cincinnati, Ohio, as a Product Development Technologist. During his 28 years at Kroger he held various positions. The last 10 years was served in a senior capacity as Vice President of Corporate Food Technology and Regulatory Compliance.

Keith started woodworking in 1971. Since that time he has made numerous family pieces of furniture with an occasional commission piece added to the workload. In 2005, he retired from industry to follow a dream and

started Clermont Woodworking and Design, Inc. Shortly thereafter, he finished his Master's in Woodworking at Marc Adams School of Woodworking.

Since retirement, he has worked full time as a furniture designer and builder. He also restores heirloom furniture and teaches at local woodworking supply retailers. In addition, he instructs 6 - 8 students on an individual basis in his shop. Current work and pictures of his shop can be viewed at www.Clermontwoodworking.com.

Seminar Overview:

The emphasis of this year's seminar is on understanding how to set-up and safely use the five most useful power tools in the woodworking shop. Those being the table saw, band saw, planer, jointer and router. The objective is to provide a learning experience for every level of expertise represented, to focus on equipment and its use rather than the completion of a project. However, Keith will use the construction of a small table to demonstrate the use of each power tool. We want to excite and encourage woodworkers to elevate their skills in the art of woodworking. I think we have all found that jigs make woodworking projects, in most cases, a lot easier. Keith will be discussing and demonstrating the use of jigs he has designed and effectively used over the years.
